#### **Sequence Justification**

**Six Traits:** These ten lessons give an overview of the Six Traits. They teach the Six Traits but can also be used to review the traits at the beginning of a new school year.

**Unit 1:** In first grade, the first nine weeks are designed to be taught in the order they appear in the manual. The sequence for this unit ensures that prerequisite skills are taught effectively, leading to the development of independent writing abilities. This approach is designed to support each child's learning journey by building skills in a logical and supportive manner.

**Personal Narrative:** This genre offers students a comfortable entry point back into writing strategies. They can delve into familiar topics they enjoy while they take the first steps into writing strategies. It's straightforward and doesn't necessitate research. Moreover, it fosters a sense of community within the class, as students share aspects of their lives with one another.

**Narrative Summary:** Teaching this genre right after personal narratives enables students to apply a new structural framework to their writing while still working within a familiar genre. Its versatility allows for repeated application throughout the school year.

**Informative Description:** The opportunities for descriptions are plentiful this time of year so students can easily find items or processes to describe while they learn a more challenging organizational structure.

**Opinion of a Topic:** Sequencing this genre after the informative writing allows students to retain the structure, but explore a new tone and voice in their writing.

**Informative How-to:** This genre could also be called procedural writing. Having the prerequisite skill of sequencing from narrative and informative will aid students as they write this genre.

**Opinion of a Book:** Waiting until March to write an opinion of a book gives students time to increase their reading skills before applying those skills in a piece of writing.

**Informative Summary:** A follow-up to informative and opinion writing, this genre helps students refine their skills in breaking down information which is a skill best used at the end of a school year when students have acquired more writing skills.

**Fictional Narrative:** Concluding the school year with fictional storytelling maintains student engagement, encouraging imagination and creativity. Additionally, it reinforces the structural concepts introduced earlier in the year, preparing students for revisiting narratives in the fall.

The suggested sequence is just one way to present the genres in Writing by Design. Schools and districts will also have success as they present the genres in a way that reflects their own pacing guides.
